DOBUTAMINE CARDIOLITE INSTRUCTIONS

You are scheduled to have a special test on your heart called a Nuclear Dobutamine Cardiolute exam performed in our office on _____ at _____ AM/PM. We realize that you may have some questions regarding this procedure and have created this pamphlet to help answer these questions. Below is a list of frequently asked questions and answers to assist you:

Are there any preparations prior to the exam?

Yes, here is a list.

1. Nothing to eat for at least 4 hours prior to the exam.
2. You may drink water right up to the time of your appointment, BUT No caffeine or anything decaffeinated for 24 hours prior to the exam (no coffee, tea, soda, or chocolate).
3. If you smoke, please refrain for at least 2 hours prior to the test.
4. If you have lung problems such as asthma, emphysema, or COPD, or a history of glaucoma, please let the technician know prior to the test.
5. Take all of your medications* prior to the exam with water, unless otherwise instructed by your physician.
6. Bring a list of your current medications with you.
7. Wear comfortable clothing and shoes for walking.
8. No Theophylline or related medicine for 24 hours prior to the procedure.

*NOTE: The following medicines should be stopped for 72 hours prior to the Cardiolute exam: These include Primatene, Brethine, Uniphyl, Slo-BID, Theo-X, Lufyllin, Theo-Dur, Persantine.

How long does the test take?

The test usually takes about 3 to 4 ½ hours.

What does the test involve?

The test involves taking pictures of the heart before AND after a stress test is performed. The pictures are taken by a special camera that detects radioactivity. An IV will be paced in your arm or hand and a small amount of radioactive material will be injected into your blood stream. This allows the camera to get the pictures of your heart. This material will not make you feel any different at all. It simply allows us to see your heart with the camera. The pictures take 25-30 minutes each.

What does the stress test involve?

A Dobutamine stress test is performed for patients who are unable to walk on a treadmill. This test involves injecting a medication called Dobutamine into an IV. This medicine places a stress on your heart just as if you were up walking. There are side effects from this medicine such as shortness of breath, chest pain, headache, and nausea. However, this medicine is infused over 4 minutes and when the infusion is complete the side effects go away very rapidly (within 2-5 minutes). The Cardiologist will be present during the infusion and will stop the test if there are changes with you or the electrocardiogram that would put you at risk.

Where are we located?

DIRECTIONS: Travel Highway 270 to Tesson Ferry Road. Travel West on Tesson Ferry for approximately 1/2 mile. Turn right on Kennerly Road, then left at the first stoplight into the entrance of the hospital campus. If you are facing the front of the hospital, the building will be to the far left.

What should I do if I am unable to keep the appointment?

We realize that there are times and instances where you may not be able to keep this appointment and because of the costs of performing this test, it is imperative that you call us 48 hours before your scheduled time to cancel and/or reschedule. If you fail to call us 48 hours prior to your scheduled test, you can be charged up to \$200.00 for the nuclear medicine that will need to be ordered specifically for you. If no call is made to us or if you do not show for your appointment, **you will be charged** up to \$200.00 for the test.
